Greetings:

As the 61st Mayor of Atlanta, I'm proud to extend my sincere congratulations to the Atlanta Sister Cities Commission (ASCC) on another remarkable year of achievements. The Commission continues to embody the spirit of international friendship through programs that bring people together, including cultural exchanges, educational partnerships, and philanthropic initiatives that strengthen Atlanta's global connections.

The City of Atlanta and the Mayor's Office of International and Immigrant Affairs (MOIIA) were proud to collaborate with ASCC throughout 2025 on several meaningful events and projects. In February, we partnered with the Mayor's Office of Cultural Affairs, Goethe Zentrum Atlanta, the Consulate General of Germany, and the Consulate General of Nigeria to present the Things Fall Apart Exhibition at Gallery 72 in Downtown Atlanta. This celebration of the film's 50th anniversary reconnected us with Atlanta's legacy in the Black film industry, the Civil Rights Movement, and our city's emergence as a global creative hub.

This year also marked the 20th anniversary of the Atlanta–Fukuoka Sister City partnership. To commemorate this milestone, Fukuoka Mayor Sōichirō Takashima, members of the Fukuoka City Council, and a youth delegation visited Atlanta for a week of cultural and educational exchange. The delegation joined Atlanta leaders to sign sister school agreements with Atlanta Public Schools, presenting a special Oribe lantern and Satsuki Azaleas at the Atlanta Botanical Garden, and met with Atlanta City Council Members, including President Doug Shipman and other local officials.

Our relationship with Nuremberg, Germany, also deepened in 2025, as students from Mays High School travelled to our sister city for a reciprocal visit. Their time in Nuremberg highlighted the enduring human rights connection between our two cities. To close the year, the Nuremberg–Atlanta Sister City Committee hosted a special Atlanta booth at the Nuremberg Christkindlesmarkt, one of Europe's oldest and most celebrated Christmas markets, sharing Atlanta's art, culture, and sports spirit with our German friends.

These exchanges remind us that global connections thrive on collaboration, creativity, and shared purpose. On behalf of the City of Atlanta, I commend the ASCC Committee Chairs, members, partners, and friends who made 2025 a truly historic year. As I begin my second term as Mayor, I look forward to continuing this work together to strengthen Atlanta's role as a leader in global engagement and cultural diplomacy.

The Atlanta Sister Cities Commission (ASCC) fosters global connections by forming friendship links between the Atlanta community and similar jurisdictions worldwide. These partnerships promote goodwill, cultural understanding, and collaboration through a wide range of mutually beneficial programs.

ASCC actively encourages the participation of diverse citizens in developing and maintaining international relationships. It oversees the establishment of sister city affiliations, managing the process and supporting dedicated committees for each recognized partnership.

The commission's vibrant exchange programs span education, culture, philanthropy, economic development, and social initiatives. These efforts have earned recognition and awards from Sister Cities International for their outstanding contributions to community outreach and economic and educational advancement.

Currently, ASCC oversees Atlanta's 17 sister city relationships, striving to enhance global awareness and foster goodwill through people-to-people diplomacy. Its platform empowers Atlantans to explore diverse cultures, expand academic horizons, stimulate trade and investment, support philanthropic efforts, and elevate Atlanta's standing in the global community.

Through strategic relationships, ASCC has contributed significantly to Atlanta's global footprint. Notable achievements include:

- **Economic Impact:** Companies like Sage North America and NurnbergMesse have chosen Atlanta for their North American operations.
- **Global Connectivity:** Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport has extended its reach to Belgium, Nigeria, Jamaica, and the Dominican Republic.
- **Educational Growth:** Georgia Tech established a global campus in France.
- **Philanthropy:** Over \$80 million in medical supplies and services have been donated, benefiting more than 50,000 patients in Jamaica.
- **Cultural Engagement:** Over 300,000 visitors annually enjoy the Atlanta Christkindl Market, celebrating German culture.

Collectively, these initiatives contribute nearly \$100 million to the local economy, driven by business and trade, tourism, education, and cultural programs. ASCC continues to position Atlanta as a leading city for international collaboration and cultural exchange.

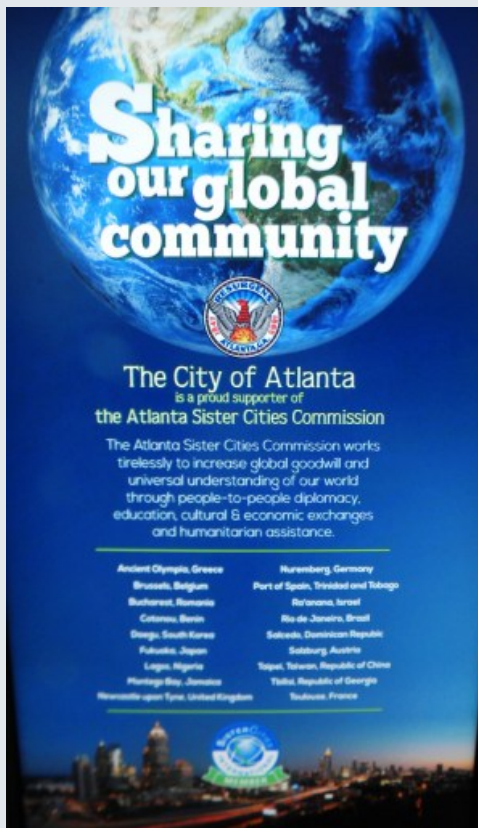
Chairman's Letter

I am pleased to submit to you the 2025 Annual Report of the Atlanta Sister Cities Commission (ASCC). In addition to the activities of the various committees, ASCC carries out its role and function in relation to Atlanta's Sister Cities program.

We were pleased to serve the City of Atlanta and its international community during 2025 and look forward to the continued growth and expansion of the Sister Cities program under your administration.



The Atlanta Sister Cities Commission (ASCC) was chartered by the City of Atlanta and codified in Atlanta City Ordinance No. 1979-71. The organization is managed by a Chair appointed by the Mayor of Atlanta and ratified by a majority of the Atlanta City Council.

The full 'board' of the Commission comprises the Chair, three additional Mayoral appointees and two members appointed by the City Council. In addition, the chairpersons of each Sister City Committee, or their designee, serve on the Commission.

Elections are held annually to select a Vice Chair, a Secretary and a Treasurer. Each elected officer serves a one-year term. Elected officials of the Commission are restricted to two consecutive terms in office.

The Commission is supported by members of the Mayor's Office staff who participate in monthly and special meetings, help shape the Commission's policy and act as liaison with the Mayor.

20th Year Celebration

The Atlanta-Fukuoka sister city partnership celebrates its 20th year in 2025

Since 2005, the sister cities across the Pacific have been collaborating on people-to-people exchanges, engaging in cultural activities, and benefiting from a robust economic relationship that has positioned Japan as one of the top investor countries in the state of Georgia.

In August 2025, to mark the 20th anniversary of the sister city partnership, Fukuoka Mayor Sōichirō Takashima led a delegation of Fukuoka City Council members, students, and other government representatives to Atlanta for a week of commemoration.

Mayor Andre Dickens and Mayor Takashima met for an engaging conversation on student exchange and the importance of empowering young people in both of our cities. Atlanta and Fukuoka share the belief that our future depends on ensuring every young person has the opportunity to succeed.

Each city enshrined its commitment to youth with a memorandum of understanding

(MoU) between the City of Fukuoka and Atlanta Public Schools. This MoU institutionalized the Fukuoka-Atlanta Youth Exchange Program, which has operated since 1996 to develop global talent and serve as a cultural bridge between Atlanta and Fukuoka.

The Mayor's Office of International and Immigrant Affairs (MOIIA) welcomed this year's cohort of the Fukuoka-Atlanta Youth Exchange Program to the City of Atlanta, where they got a glimpse of City Hall history and learned how MOIIA seeks to create a welcoming environment for visitors across the

globe. Coretta Scott King Young Women's Leadership Academy and Fukusho High School established a Sister School Declaration, intended to expand on their existing partnership in school exchanges and support the Japanese language program at Coretta Scott King.

In addition to the Mayoral meeting, Atlanta City Council President Doug Shipman and City Council Member Jason Dozier welcomed seven Fukuoka City Council representatives to Atlanta City Hall. The discussion centered on challenges that both cities face and the innovative policies and solutions each city is implementing to address issues of housing, transportation, and sustainability.

To wrap up the activities, the Mayor's Office of International and Immigrant Affairs, as well as the City of Atlanta's Chief Operating Officer LaChandra Burks, and City Council President Doug Shipman, joined the Japan-America Society of Georgia for their Annual Gala and a special unveiling of the newest Oribe lantern and Satsuki azaleas, gifted to the Atlanta Botanical Garden by the City of Fukuoka. The lantern and azaleas are available for the public to enjoy at the Atlanta Botanical Garden's Japanese Garden.

This important anniversary brought Fukuoka to Atlanta and continues to honor two decades of collaboration and friendship, reaffirming our shared commitment to building a brighter future through global connection.

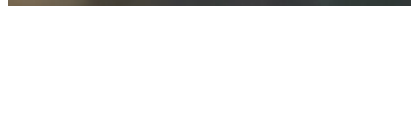

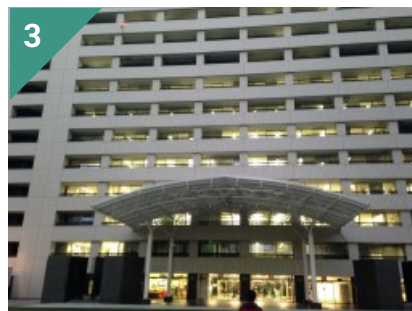
