#### Greetings:

As the 61st Mayor of Atlanta, I am pleased to offer my support to the Atlanta Sister Cities Commission (ASCC) and Atlanta's 17 sister-city relationships. Our involvement with the ASCC spans decades, and it serves as an essential part of Atlanta's international community.

My administration and the Mayor's Office of International and Immigrant Affairs work to promote peace and prosperity through subnational diplomacy. The work of the dedicated ASCC chairs and committee members supports this mission and continues to position Atlanta as a global city.

This year, the ASCC celebrated two milestone anniversaries. We commemorated the 50th anniversary of Atlanta's sister-city relationships with Lagos, Nigeria, and Toulouse, France. In partnership with the Mayor's Office of International and Immigrant Affairs and the Mayor's Office of Cultural Affairs, we unveiled Atlanta's newest murals created by Nigerian and French artists. Atlanta-based and Lagos-born artist Chinemerem Omeh unveiled his mural titled "Old Tunes Awaken the Young Spirit," which incorporates cultural elements of his native Nigeria and the state of Georgia. In addition, Toulouse artist Tilt returned to Atlanta to restore his Downtown mural, "Flag," which he created in 2012. This mural, a Downtown stable for over ten years, highlights the lasting relationship between our two cities.

Continuing our Year of the Youth initiatives, we have also welcomed several high school youth delegations to the City of Atlanta from Belgium, Fukuoka, and Nuremberg. These students visited Atlanta to interact with local high school students, learn about Atlanta's civil rights history, and expand their cultural awareness.

I encourage you to explore the ASCC 2024 Annual Report to view the dozens of activities and achievements of the Committees this year. I always say that Atlanta is a group project. Progress would not be possible without the efforts made by the Atlanta Sister Cities Commission, advocates, and volunteers who work tirelessly to empower and build upon people-to-people diplomacy.

The City of Atlanta salutes the Atlanta Sister Cities Commission's continued efforts to strengthen relations with our counterparts across the globe. We look forward to continuing to foster and strengthen these relationships.

Its platform empowers Atlantans to explore diverse cultures, expand academic horizons, stimulate trade and investment, support philanthropic efforts, and elevate Atlanta's standing in the global community.




Atlanta's sister cities activities contribute to the local economy through business and trade, tourism, education, and cultural programs.

Through strategic relationships, ASCC has contributed significantly to Atlanta's global footprint. Notable achievements include:

- Economic Impact: Companies like Sage North America and Nurnberg Messe have chosen Atlanta for their North American operations.
- Global Connectivity: Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport has extended its reach to Belgium, Nigeria, Jamaica, and the Dominican Republic.
- Educational Growth: Georgia Tech established a global campus in France.
- Philanthropy: Over \$80 million in medical supplies and services have been donated, benefiting more than 50,000 patients in Jamaica.
- Cultural Engagement: Over 300,000 visitors annually enjoy the Atlanta Christkindl Market, celebrating German culture.


### **Chairman's Letter**

We were pleased to serve the City of Atlanta and its international community during 2024 and look forward to the continued growth and expansion of the Sister Cities program under your administration.



The Atlanta Sister Cities Commission (ASCC) was chartered by the City of Atlanta and codified in Atlanta City Ordinance No. 1979-71. The organization is managed by a Chair appointed by the Mayor of Atlanta and ratified by a majority of the Atlanta City Council.

The full 'board' of the Commission comprises the Chair, three additional Mayoral appointees and two members appointed by the City Council. In addition, the chairpersons of each Sister City Committee, or their designee, serve on the Commission.

Elections are held annually to select a Vice Chair, a Secretary and a Treasurer. Each elected officer serves a one-year term. Elected officials of the Commission are restricted to two consecutive terms in office.

The Commission is supported by members of the Mayor's Office staff who participate in monthly and special meetings, help shape the Commission's policy and act as liaison with the Mayor.

### **50th Year Celebrations**

#### Atlanta sister city partnerships celebrate their 50th year in 2024—Lagos, Nigeria and Toulouse, France.



The 50th Anniversary of the Atlanta-Lagos sister-city relationship is celebrated at a reception honoring the placement of a mural by Lagos artist Chinemerem Omeh in downtown Atlanta.

The sister city relationship between Atlanta and Lagos dates back to 1974 under Mayor Maynard Holbrook Jackson whose sister was married to a Nigerian living in Lagos. It was Atlanta's first African sister city, validating Atlanta's claim as America's gateway city to Africa.

The Atlanta-Lagos Sister City Committee played a major role in the establishment of the Consulate General of Nigeria in Atlanta and the addition of Delta Air Lines' direct nonstop flight between Atlanta and Lagos.

Through these efforts there has been a steady rise in Atlanta's Nigerian population and Nigerian organizations in the metro Atlanta area. Atlanta is now home to the fifth largest Nigerian diaspora population in the United States.

It has also created improved opportunities for Nigerians living in the Atlanta Metro area but particularly students attending area schools.

Atlanta-Lagos Sister City Committee developed a counterpart committee in Lagos to provide a link and official ties between Lagos and Atlanta. It provides support for the Consulate and a leadership mentoring role for the emerging multitude of Nigerian organizations.

Atlanta began her official sister city relationship with Toulouse on December 17, 1974 when then mayors Maynard Jackson of Atlanta and Pierre Baudis of Toulouse signed a proclamation declaring Toulouse and Atlanta sister cities. Jackson had lived in Toulouse as a child, while his mother was pursuing her doctorate in French. He felt that the two sister cities would make excellent partners.

Since 1974, the Atlanta Toulouse Sister City Committee has maintained an active and productive relationship with Toulouse, France. With a membership in Georgia of over 100, the Atlanta Toulouse Sister Cities Committee communicates with our corresponding committee in Toulouse, and we maintain a focus on French culture. We host visitors from Toulouse who come to Atlanta for business or social purposes. We share activities with Alliance Francaise, the French American Chamber of Commerce-Atlanta, and the French Heritage Society that promote French-American collaborations and expansion of interests.
